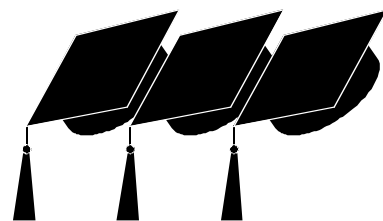

This year they took home the Lackawanna League Championship and placed second in the District Duels. They had some very tough matches along the way as they suffered a close loss to Pittston and were easily defeated by Whitehall. But the Invaders bounced back by defeating Lackawanna Trail, Abington, and Berwick twice, all of which are considered to be good wrestling schools.

After the team matches were over, the individual wrestlers began to shine. All of the wrestlers made it to Districts but only five qualified for Regionals. Donell Young, Bob Baresse, Dave Morgan, Nelson Villafane, and Tom Hirschler

College Hall Of Fame Inducts Former West Star

Recently, the College Football Hall Of Fame announced its inductees for this year. Among the inductees were some of pro football's best like Ronnie Lott and Dan Marino. The name that stood out the most to West Scranton Alumni was that of Cosmo Iacavazzi. Iacavazzi, a former West Scranton Football standout, was elected into the College Football Hall Of Fame. Iacavazzi graduated West Scranton in 1961. While at West, Iacavazzi was the Football Captain, Senoir Class President, Yearbook Co-Editor, a member of the National Honor Society, Lettermen's Club. He received second honors in history and mathematics. Iacavazzi received football scholarships to Princeton, Syracuse, Iowa State, Penn State,

Notre Dame, West Point, Penn, and Cornell. He chose Princeton.

Iacavazzi had a very successful football career at Princeton. He was named to the All-Ivy team in 1963 and 1964 as running back and received first team honors at linebacker in 1963. Iacavazzi led the nation in scoring in 1963, was named to first team All-America in 1964, was Princeton's team captain in 1964, and received the Poe-Kazmaier Trophy awarded to a player who best exemplified loyalty and devotion to Princeton. Iacavazzi graduated Princeton in 1965 with first a Bachelors and then a Masters degree in aero-engineering. Iacavazzi was then drafted by the New York Jets of the American Football League (AFL) but his pro career did not last very long.

Mr. Iacavazzi is currently president of Marjem Management Co. He formerly was an engineer for Boeing Aircraft, vice president of Smith Barney, and was president of Hillsborough Cable Vision.

We, at West Scranton, congratulate Mr. Iacavazzi on his induction into the College Football Hall of Fame. He serves as an inspiration to every Invader, past, present and future.

A Uniform Musing

The discussion rages, dividing the school, dividing the city, and dividing us into opposing camps: shall we, the students, be imposed upon to don the garb of standardization? In other words: will we be forced to wear school uniforms?

My response to this is simple and direct: absolutely not. The reasons for my mindset are, also, simple and direct of which I respectfully present.

A pro-uniform argument: uniforms prevent the wearing of clothes that reveal too much. Well, are these types of clothes (i.e., tanktops, cut-offs, mini-skirts, etc.) even allowed now? No, of course not. A dress code exists in both the city's high schools, outlining specific examples of what may be considered lewd or offensive dress. The reason offenders are not punished is because neither faculty nor staff does any actual punishing. Few enforce this dress code. I myself have known particular teachers to send students to the main office for being too scantily clad only to have the students sent back to class without penalty. When

the few were let off the hook, the precedent stuck and now all are let off.

And how would the students who make it a point to cross the line each day be discouraged by the implementation of uniforms? They will dress that way just for the sheer point of doing so. Why not just a slightly stricter dress code, especially one that would encourage enforcement? It is really all that we need.

There are also, of course, the good old freedoms of speech and of choice arguments. Why should we be forced to wear only certain colors and styles? Where is the individualism that the school system has always tried to encourage? We are told since grammar school to respect others *for*, not *in spite of*, their differences. Over time, our differences became our strengths, our individualism defined who we are and determined our niche in the world. So, now, they say I must be forced to look like everyone else. (Don't try to convince me that different versions of the uniform provide diversity. It doesn't, all of the middle schoolers still pretty much have exactly the same drab color and style blanketing them all, no matter how the

buttons are arranged or the neck is cut). Maybe I might actually want to look different; maybe I like having a touch of originality and creativity in my shirts. Some like to be conservative, some like Hawaiian, some like skulls and paper clips, some like gothic, some like whatever is in the current issue of *Vogue*. The point is, we aren't hurting anybody, we aren't offending anybody, so what's wrong with it? Why must we be punished for who we are?

Uniforms will cut down on prejudice and improve people's views of each other. I swear to God that I heard this from many uniform-supporters I have questioned. Reality check! Prejudice is based on background and/or skin color; a person's clothes, while may



be ridiculed, will neither help nor hinder prejudice. The popular are not popular because of what they wear, they are popular because of how others feel when they are around them. Racists will be racist whether their target is in a uniform or not. Also, anyone who believes that he or she can change how people think by simply making arbitrary decisions from behind a desk is sadly mistaken. People will view the world in any way they see fit and no one is going to change that.

A conundrum I see arises: what about students who wear clothes reflecting strong religious beliefs? What must happen to them? The school system has not the power to tell these people to wear uniforms. That would be an entirely different argument, dealing with the abridgement of a citizen's freedom of religion, and would be protected by bitter court battles if it ever came to pass. Uniforms cannot apply to them. So, if the original intention of uniforms is to promote student unity, then the ideal of this intention fails. In today's classroom, the religious dress simply blends in among our heterogeneous crowd, just one of many outfits reflecting personal beliefs. In

tomorrow's classroom, the majority is alike, and this minority will stick out, the object of unrestricted scrutiny. (Some claim that they are like that now, simply for who they are. I point out that, being the only ones in the school who would not appear like anyone else, they would truly be then the proverbial sore thumbs).

So it's lose-lose for these guys, right? Or maybe we should simply ignore them? It's not like the outcries of the individual matters in this city anymore, eh?

One notion that I would also like to dispel is that uniforms will be cheaper for everyone. Not for me, though, and I'm not alone. Right now, the average WSIS student pays over \$125-200 for a wardrobe about 4 to 6 sets large. That means a single uniform costs a good \$25-30. All well and good for the middle and upper middle classes, it won't be too much of price shift for them. But, how about we lower middle and lower class folk? You know, the ones who buy off the bargain rack because we simply have to? (Yes, we do exist). Uniforms are just more of a burden than regular clothes, at least, for the people, including myself, who have to actually stretch funds

in-between paychecks. If uniforms, then, constitute our school clothes and take up a large portion of our clothing budget, what, then, do we use as money to buy our everyday clothes?

Well, these are simply a few of my arguments. Mayhap, by the publication of this article, a decision may have already been reached. If uniforms are shot-down, then this can just serve to insure against future re-occurrences. If they are approved, then just realize that only the battle is lost, the war continues on. This topic won't be subject to death anytime soon, and it will be months before finalization can be said to truly occur. Then, they'll have to try to enforce it. That in itself will be a war because there will be those, un-roused by debate, that will be finally wakened and won't take this lying down, basically, the ones who don't care about politics until they themselves are affected.

So, in ending, all I can say to you all is to speak your minds. Go out, give your opinion, find a forum of open debate involving the city's school board in some manner. The Powers That Be will never truly know what their constituents want until you actually tell them yourselves.
